

Head baseball coach Sean McNally enters his third season at the helm of the Duke baseball team after returning to his alma mater prior to the 2006 season.

In his first two seasons, McNally led the Blue Devils to drastic improvements in nearly every facet of the game and looks to build off a successful 2007 campaign that saw the team flirt with a 30-win season. Despite having a combined 15 freshmen and sophomores on the 2007 squad compared to just six juniors and two seniors, the McNally-led Blue Devils notched 29 victories with a lineup that featured three major league draft picks and a Freshman All-America selection.

After jumping out to a 15-1 record following a nine-game win streak to open the season, McNally guided Duke to eight wins in ACC play with upsets over Georgia Tech, then-No.1-ranked Florida State and College World Series runner-up North Carolina. Duke also claimed a victory over Virginia and took two of three games from Virginia Tech while claiming series sweeps over three opponents.

The key to the team's success was marked improvement in all aspects of the game, a goal that McNally set for his squad prior to the 2007 season.

"Our general goal was to be collectively better in all phases of the game and I feel we accomplished this task in 2007," McNally said. "Our players worked hard throughout the year

to continually improve and I am glad that they got some positive results."

Duke finished the 2007 season with a collective batting average of .302, marking the first time since 1998 that the team batted over .300. The Blue Devils also lowered their team ERA to 4.50 while holding opponents to a .275 batting average, both among the best marks over the past 10 seasons. McNally also coached Duke's first All-ACC selection since 2004 in right-hander Tony Bajoczy, who went 9-3 with a 3.22 ERA during the 2007 season.

McNally has also drawn in a pair of recruiting classes that have already made immense contributions and solidified a firm foundation for the program's future. McNally's 2006 recruits included Freshman All-America closer Michael Seander, starting middle infielders Gabriel Saade and Ryan McCurdy and pitcher/outfielder Alex Hassan, all of whom cemented roles as starters early in the 2007 season.

McNally's impact on the program is evident in the statistics as well as in the quality of his student-athletes. In addition to the on-field accomplishments, the Duke baseball team has enjoyed consistent success in the classroom. Senior Tony Bajockzy and sophomore Nate Freiman were named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District III second team last season while also receiving All-ACC Academic honors along with Saade and sophomore Matt Williams. Additionally, McNally has placed 21 players on the ACC Academic Honor Roll during his two-year tenure.

Additionally, four former Blue Devils, including Brett Bartles, Larry Broadway, Tony Runion and Ryan Jackson, have returned to Duke under McNally's tenure to complete their degree requirements. All four Blue Devils enjoyed successful careers on the Duke baseball team before departing early for the major leagues after being drafted as juniors.

The Blue Devils have also become active members of the Durham community under McNally's watch, taking time to participate in numerous community service initiatives. Projects include the Duke-sponsored Verizon Read, the Urban Ministries Soup Kitchen and a cleanup of Lyon Park among several others.

During his playing career at Duke, McNally was a four-year starter and served as team captain for his final two seasons. As a senior in 1994, he received All-ACC honors and set single-season school records for batting average (.408) and slugging percentage (.775), while finishing the season with 89 hits, 19 doubles, eight triples, 17 home runs and 71 RBI. He ranks among the top five in school history with 17 triples and 181 RBI in his career and among the top 10 in runs scored, batting average, hits and doubles.

Following four seasons in the Blue and White, McNally was selected in the 16th round of the 1994 Major League Baseball Draft by the Kansas City Royals and played nine seasons of professional baseball. He reached as high as the Triple-A level with Calgary (Florida Marlins) in 2002, and Buffalo (Cleveland Indians) and Tucson (Arizona Diamondbacks) in 2001. In 1999, McNally was named to the Texas League (AA) All-Star Team after posting a .282 batting average along with 36 home runs and 109 RBI. Overall, he played for six professional organizations, including Kansas City (1994-99), Florida (2000), Cleveland (2001), Arizona (2001), Texas (2002) and Montreal (2002).

Prior to taking the reigns of the Blue Devil baseball team, McNally spent three years coaching in the professional ranks for Cleveland Indians affiliates Burlington (A) and Akron (AA). He served as the hitting coach for both squads before being promoted to manager of the Burlington Indians in 2005. As the hitting coach for the Akron Aeros in 2004, McNally instructed several professional players on their way to the majors, including Ben Francisco (OF, Cleveland Indians), Ryan Garko (1B, Cleveland Indians), Franklin Gutierrez (OF, Cleveland Indians), Joe Inglett (IF, AAA Buffalo) and Kevin Kouzmanoff (3B, San Diego Padres).

Additionally, McNally served as an academic advisor within the Duke Athletic Department from 2003-04, where he managed the Verizon Read with the Blue Devils community outreach program.

McNally is married to the former Kim Voyticky, an All-ACC performer in track and field at Duke. The couple recently had their first child, a baby girl named Michaela.

Sean Snedeker returns for his second season as an assistant on the Duke coaching staff after joining the team prior to the 2007 season. Snedeker will once again oversee the development of Duke's pitching staff.

In his first season at Duke, Snedeker managed a Blue Devil pitching staff that turned in a combined 4.50 ERA for the team's lowest mark in over a decade. Under Snedeker's guidance, Duke pitchers allowed the second fewest hits and walks in the ACC in 2007, giving up just 517 hits and surrendering only 168 free passes. The 168 walks marked Duke's lowest total since 1994, while the 517 hits were the fewest allowed since 1998. Among his top performers in 2007 were senior All-ACC selection Tony Bajoczky, who was drafted by the Boston Red Sox after posting a career-best 9-3 record, and Freshman All-America Michael Seander, who concluded his freshman campaign with nine saves and a team-low 1.61 ERA.

Snedeker's influence was most noticeable in the case of Bajoczky, who entered his senior season with a career record of 3-11 and a cumulative ERA of 6.70. In just one season with the Tallahassee, Fla., native, Snedeker turned Bajoczky into one of the most dominant pitchers in the ACC and Duke's first All-ACC selection since 2004.

Snedeker was also instrumental in developing what turned out to be one of the most successful crop of freshman pitchers in school history. In addition to Seander, Snedeker mentored freshmen Michael Ness, Will Currier and Jonathan Foreman, who combined for 9 of Duke's 29 victories in 2007. Ness turned in a 4-3 record with 23 appearances on the year, including two starts, and contributed 58.0 innings on the mound. Currier quickly emerged as one of Duke's top bullpen options, logging 41.0 innings over 17 appearances while compiling a 4-0 record and a 3.51 ERA.

Also among Snedeker's top projects were two-way freshmen Alex Hassan and Jeremy Gould. Also listed as outfielders, Snedeker molded the two Blue Devils into viable pitching options in their first season. Hassan quickly solidified a spot as a weekend starter and made 11 starts on the mound to finish with a pair of wins and a 5.80 ERA through over 54 innings of work. Gould became one of Duke's top performers out of the bullpen, logging four consecutive scoreless relief appearances to end the season, all of which were against ACC opponents.

A native of Bryan, Texas, Snedeker brings a wealth of experience to Duke after spending 12 seasons as a pitching coach in

the Chicago White Sox organization and one season with a Los Angeles Dodgers affiliate in the Pioneer League. Snedeker worked primarily with developing talent at the Class-A and Rookie levels, most recently with the White Sox' Class-A affiliate Kannapolis Intimidators. Snedeker has coached over 30 current or former major league pitchers, most notably 2005 American League All-Star Jon Garland.

Additionally, Snedeker's 2002 Kannapolis Intimidators pitching staff led all White Sox farm teams with a 3.63 ERA and 1,000 strikeouts, while his Advanced Rookie pitching corps in Bristol led the Appalachian League in strikeouts and saves and finished second in ERA.

Snedeker also spent six seasons as a player in the Los Angeles Dodgers system after being selected in the 30th round of the 1988 MLB Amateur Draft. He reached as high as the AA level and finished his career with a combined 34-21 record and a 3.24 ERA while starting over 70 games on the mound. His career highlight came at Class-A Vero Beach when he tossed a seven-inning perfect game on August 28, 1991 against St. Lucie.

As a right-handed pitcher at Texas A&M from 1987-88, Snedeker compiled a 17-4 overall record on the mound in two seasons of work. In 1988, Snedeker turned in a 9-2 record and a 3.50 ERA while striking out 87

Matthew Boggs enters his third season as an assistant coach at Duke after joining the team prior to the 2006 season. Boggs will once again oversee the catchers and assist with coaching the hitters. Additionally, Boggs was recently promoted to recruiting coordinator and will look to continue the program's strong recruiting trend.

Under Boggs' direction, Duke had one of the best defensive outfield units in the nation in 2007, as the Blue Devils committed just two errors in the outfield all season. The starting duo of senior Jonathan Anderson and junior Jimmy Gallagher each turned in perfect 1.000 fielding percentages in the outfield, while starting freshman Alex Hassan committed just two faults all season.

With Boggs' assistance, Duke batted .302 on the season, marking the first time since 1998 that the Blue Devils batted over .300 as a team. Five Blue Devils finished with averages over .300, including Gallagher, who finished with a .360 clip on the way to a seventh-round selection by the Chicago White Sox. At 239th overall, Gallagher became the highest-drafted Duke outfielder in program history. During his five-year coaching career, Boggs has already mentored 15 players who have reached the professional ranks.

Prior to his start at Duke, Boggs spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Tulane where he coached outfielders and hitters. He helped lead the Green Wave to the Conference USA regular season and co-tournament titles in 2005 along with a College World Series berth. Under his direction at Tulane, three players earned first team Conference USA honors, including the C-USA Player and Freshman of the Year. Boggs also spent one season as an assistant coach at Georgia Southern in 2003.

A standout infielder during his four-year playing career at Georgia Tech from 1998-2002, Boggs ranks among the school's top 10 in runs scored and games played and 15th in total hits. Boggs turned in batting averages over .300 in each of his four seasons, including a .363 clip as a senior when he knocked 12 doubles, two triples and drove in 43 RBI to help the Yellow Jackets to the College World Series. Boggs served as team captain as a junior and a senior and finished his career with a .337 batting average, a .463 on base percentage and 41 stolen bases. He also holds the Georgia Tech career record for most times hit by a pitch in a career and a single season.

A four-time member of the ACC Academic Honor Roll while at Georgia Tech, Boggs was a standout in the classroom as well. He earned Verizon District III Academic All-America honors in 1999, 2001 and 2002 and a second team Academic All-America selection as a senior.

A 2002 graduate of Georgia Tech, Boggs holds a B.S. degree in Textile and Fiber Engineering. He has a brother, Mitchell, who is a pitcher in the St. Louis Cardinals organization.

Former Blue Devil outfielder and left-handed pitcher Jonathan Anderson will stay on as a volunteer assistant coach after graduating in 2007 following a four-year playing career at Duke. Anderson's responsibilities will include coaching the outfielders, running the bunting program and assisting with base running and hitting. He will also coach first base and is in charge of the Duke Baseball Academy and the academic development of the student-athletes.

Anderson played in 187 games for the Blue Devils from 2004-07 while starting 169 contests over his career. As a senior, he put it together on the mound and at the plate, finishing with a .337 batting average and a 2.91 ERA. Anderson scored 40 runs while swiping 14 stolen bases and laying down a league-leading 20 sacrifice bunts. He was one of Duke's most consistent fielders as well, going errorless in 107 opportunities in the outfield. The southpaw also compiled a 3-4 record, three saves and a 2.91 ERA on the mound in 2007, notching eight starts and 19 total appearances.

As a freshman and a junior, Anderson started every game for Duke, while leading the team in batting average (.313) as a junior and steals (16) as a freshman. Anderson put together a career .280 batting average with 174 hits, 119 runs and 41 stolen bases. He finished his career with the 10th-most stolen bases in school history.

"We are excited to have a person of great character in Jonathan Anderson join our staff here at Duke," head coach Sean McNally said. "I have enjoyed coaching Jonathan the past two seasons and look forward to the many positive qualities that he will bring to our program in this new role. He is a student of the game with a tremendous work ethic who had success both on the mound and in the outfield here at Duke. His energy, enthusiasm and passion for both Duke University and Duke Baseball will be a welcome addition."

Born in Cincinnati, Ohio, and a native of Miami, Fla., Anderson graduated from Duke in 2007 with a degree in History.



Nate Freiman, a 6-8, 240 pound junior, started every game last season and will once again anchor the lineup as one of Duke's top run producers. As the starting first baseman, Freiman batted .369 last season while leading the team in batting average and hits and sharing the team lead with seven home runs and 48 RBI. He also put together 24 multiple hit games and 12 contests with two or more RBI while owning the second-longest hitting streak on the team at 14 games. One of the team's most consistent performers at the plate, Freiman is also a tremendous asset in the field. He was second on the team with a .988 fielding percentage after committing just six errors in a team-leading 502 chances. With an all-around solid game and a career .346 batting average, Freiman has the potential to emerge as one of the top hitters in the ACC in 2008.

Freiman also serves as a backup catcher and started nine games behind the plate last season. If Freiman were to step in for starting catcher Matt Williams, senior **Jonathan Nicolla** and freshman **Grant Monroe** would be available for backup duties.

Nicolla started four games at first and 17 as the designated hitter in 2007, batting .321 with 18 RBI. The 6-2, 220 pounder also knocked three home runs and five doubles to finish with a .488 slugging percentage while crossing the plate 14 times. He was more than serviceable in the field and did not commit an error in 39 chances for a perfect 1.000 fielding percentage.

Monroe was a three-time all-state selection out of Schaumburg High School.



Third Base

Sophomore **Ryan McCurdy**, who started 39 games in the infield as a freshman, will take over duties at the hot corner. At 5-10, 170 pounds, McCurdy committed just eight errors in 188 chances as a freshman while spending the majority of his playing time at second base. One of the most reliable defensive players on the team, McCurdy was also putting together a nice offensive season before a shoulder injury sidelined him for the remainder of the year. In 39 games in 2007, all starts, McCurdy batted .260 with 38 hits, 21 RBI and 24 runs scored while stringing together a nine-game hitting streak that ended after a 5-for-5 outing on March 3. McCurdy struck out just 11 times in 146 at bats while drawing eight walks. One of the most reliable defensive players on the team, McCurdy put together a streak of 49 consecutive fielding opportunities without committing an error over his last 10 games.

Backing up McCurdy will be freshman **Ben Condon**. Condon, who comes to Duke after an outstanding prep career at Woodward Academy in Peachtree City, Ga., was twice named team MVP in high school and collected all-state honors as a senior. A three-time all-area selection and an all-state honoree as a senior, Condon batted .456 as a senior and .420 as a junior while also turning in a .508 clip with the East Cobb Yankees during the summer.


Middle Infield

Sophomore **Gabriel Saade**, a 5-11, 180 pound infielder, will shift to second base after starting 48 games at shortstop as a freshman. Saade was part of 25 doubles plays last season and should work well in the middle with freshman **Jake Lemmerman** taking over at shortstop. A native of Miami, Fla., Saade has the offensive potential to be one of the top run scorers in the lineup. He mashed five home runs as a freshman while driving in 36 runs and scoring 34 times. He also swiped 11 bases in 13 attempts while drawing 19 walks at the plate.

Lemmerman, a freshman and a four-year letterman at Corona Del Mar High School, will most likely get the opening day start at shortstop after putting together an impressive fall campaign for the Blue Devils. A four-time all-league selection in high school, Lemmerman was named the Newport Mesa Player of the Year as a senior after batting .472 with 10 home runs and 36 RBI. He showed consistency at the plate throughout his high school career, turning in a .392 average as a sophomore and following with a .430 clip as a junior. At 6-2 and 180 pounds,

Lemmerman is a multi-tool player who could be one of the ACC's top newcomers in 2008.

Freshman **Dennis O'Grady** is also available for middle infield duties. O'Grady was a three-year letterman at Archbishop Molloy High School where he was named the Queens Courier Player of the Year as a junior. O'Grady comes to Duke fresh off a senior campaign in which he batted .375 with six home runs and 55 RBI.

Matt Williams, a 5-10, 200 pound junior, returns as one of the top all-around players on the team and will once again serve as the Blue Devil backstop. A two-year starter, Williams possesses tremendous defensive skills behind the plate and has already started over 100 games in his career. He also made strides in the batter's box last season, displaying improved plate discipline while finishing with the fourth-highest batting average on the team at .308. A native of Northville, Mich., Williams knocked in 29 RBI and scored 30 runs while connecting on 53 hits and drawing 21 walks. He also gunned down 15 runners from behind the plate.

Senior **Kyle Kreick** could also see action behind the plate and will serve as the backup to Williams. Kreick, who was converted to the position after playing in the infield as a freshman and sophomore, has improved his defensive abilities since his junior campaign. Expected to contribute offensively as well, Kreick could earn his playing time with solid offensive production. Kreick batted .284 as a junior while playing in 12 games. He started two contests as a designated hitter.

Junior first baseman **Nate Freiman** also spent time at catcher last season, starting nine games at the position. He will also be available to spell Williams.

Outfield

Returning starter **Alex Hassan** will anchor Duke's outfield, while a number of returning players and newcomers have a shot at claiming the other two starting positions.

Hassan, a 6-3, 190 pound sophomore, spent time in left and right field in 2007, starting a combined 41 games in the outfield. He could see action at all three spots in 2008 and has the tools to play all three. Hassan should once again be one of Duke's top offensive contributors after mashing 17 extra base hits as a freshman, including three triples and a pair of home runs to drive in 37 runs. Hassan crossed the plate 39 times as a freshman while stealing seven bases in nine attempts.

Jeremy Gould, a 6-3, 195 pound sophomore, is also in the hunt for a starting spot and will look to improve on a freshman season in which he batted .284 with nine RBI and 12 runs scored. Gould started 18 games as a freshman, including four in left field. Over 67 at bats, Gould knocked 19 total hits, including five doubles, and swiped three bases. He drove in nine RBI and scored 12 times while putting together a .383 on base percentage.

Both Gould and Hassan could also spend time on the mound, which will open the door for a number of other Blue Devils. Junior **Tim Sherlock** will be in the mix after seeing action in 31 total contests last season, including 13 starts in left field. Sherlock batted .267 with six RBI and 11 runs scored last season and hit .404 on balls he put in play. A former 32nd-round draft choice out of high school, the 6-0, 185 pound Sherlock could lock down a starting spot with consistent production at the plate.

Sophomore **Michael Ghizzoni** will also provide a steady defensive option throughout the season, while classmate **Christopher Manno** and freshmen **Tom Luciano** and **John Bunder** could also see playing time. Ghizzoni played in 15 games as a freshman while starting four, including three in left field. He knocked five hits last season, three of which went for extra bases.

Manno made one start in left field, while spending the majority of his playing time on the mound. Manno batted .222 over nine at bats, collecting a pair of hits while crossing the plate four times.

Luciano comes to Duke as a four-year letterman out of Fox Lane High School and was ranked among the top-35 prospects and top-10 outfielders in the Northeast. Luciano batted .498 as a junior with 36 stolen bases and 54 runs scored and was an all-league sprinter on the track team.

Bunder comes to Duke after a three-year playing career at Harrison High School where he twice earned all-county honors. Bunder batted .410 as a senior with seven home runs, seven doubles and 29 RBI and also led the team in wins on the mound.

With 11 of 13 pitchers returning from 2007, the Duke pitching staff will once again provide a solid foundation for the team's success in 2008.

Sophomore **Michael Seander** returns after collecting three Freshman All-America awards in 2007 when he emerged as one of the top closers in the ACC. Seander picked up nine saves in a team-leading 28 appearances as a freshman, while putting together a team-low 1.61 ERA through 50 innings of work. At 6-2, 215 pounds, Seander could see work as a starter, but has already proven his worth as a top-end reliever.

Sophomore **Michael Ness** is also coming off an impressive freshman campaign in which he posted a 4-3 record through 23 appearances that spanned 58 total innings. A 6-4, 205 pound righty, Ness possesses great command of his pitches, as evidenced by his 41 strikeouts and 15 walks in 2007.

Junior **Andrew Wolcott** will once again be counted on to shoulder a heavy workload this season after topping 60 innings in each of his first two seasons. Wolcott turned in a 4-3 record and a 6.10 ERA through 10 starts and seven relief outings last season.

Sophomores **Will Currier** and **Jonathan Foreman** will both focus solely on pitching duties this season after splitting time in the field as freshmen. Last season, the two combined for 24 relief appearances and three starts. Currier, a 6-4, 205 pound right-hander, turned in a 4-0 record and a 3.51 ERA and was very effective in clutch situations, allowing just three of his 19 inherited runners to score. Foreman, a 5-11, 195 pound righty, made eight relief appearances and two starts last season to finish with a 1-1 record.



Also expected to make significant contributions are a number of talented freshmen. Newcomers **Sam Allen**, **John Bunder**, **Ryan Knott**, **Grant Monroe**, **Dennis O'Grady**, and **Cameron Schulz** have the talent to make an immediate impact in their inaugural season.



2008 Season Outlook

When head coach **Sean McNally** graduated from Duke in 1994, the Blue Devils had just put together a 33-20 record, marking the third straight season which the team had topped 30 victories. That same year, the Blue Devils set the school's single season home run, runs scored and RBI records before McNally and two of his teammates were selected in the 1994 MLB draft.

Now in his third year as head coach of the Blue Devils, McNally looks to rebuild the Duke baseball program into the same powerhouse that he helped create in the early 1990s.

And Duke is well on its way after flirting with 30 wins in 2007.

Despite playing with a young roster that featured a combined 15 freshmen and sophomores, Duke finished last season with a 29-25 overall record, marking the program's most wins since 1998. Led by a talented pitching staff and a crop of young talent, the Blue Devils batted .302 on the season and finished with a 4.50 team ERA. With just four players departing from last season's squad, Duke returns six of nine starting position players and eight pitchers who made 10 or more appearances in 2007.

Despite the losses of outfielder and left-handed pitcher **Jonathan Anderson** to graduation and right-handed ace **Tony Bajoczky**, third baseman **Brett Bartles** and outfielder **Jimmy Gallagher** to the draft, Duke returns a core of 19 letterwinners from a 2007 squad that finished with the most RBI, runs scored and extra base hits since 2002 and the highest batting average in over a decade. Also returning are 11 of 13 pitchers from a 2007 staff that gave up the fewest hits over the last nine seasons.



The Duke baseball team will look to build off of a 2007 campaign that saw the Blue Devils flirt with their first 30-win season in nearly a decade. Under the guidance of third-year head coach **Sean McNally**, the Blue Devils went 29-25 in 2007 and return 19 letterwinners from last season's squad.

Duke's infield remains mostly intact, as all but Bartles return from last season's group. Junior **Nate Freiman** will start at first base, while sophomore **Gabriel Saade** will shift to second and classmate **Ryan McCurdy** will slide over to third base in place of Bartles. Junior backstop **Matt Williams** will return for his third season as the starting catcher, while freshman **Jake Lemmerman**, a four-year letterman out of Corona Del Mar High School, is the lone newcomer to the group and will take over at shortstop.

With the departure of Gallagher and Anderson, Duke's outfield will undergo a makeover, with sophomore **Alex Hassan** returning as the lone starter from last season's squad. Classmate **Jeremy Gould** could earn a spot alongside Hassan, while Junior **Tim Sherlock** is a likely candidate to hold down the final outfield position. Sherlock started 13 games in left field as a sophomore, while Gould started four contests in the outfield.

Sophomore **Michael Ghizzoni** is also in the mix in the outfield, as is freshman **Tom Luciano**. Ghizzoni is one of the top defensive options off the bench and was called on to participate in 15 games as a freshman, while Luciano comes to Duke as a three-year letterman out of Fox Lane High School where he batted .498 with 36 stolen bases as a junior.

With 11 of 13 pitchers returning from last season's squad, the Blue Devil pitching staff will once again provide a solid foundation for success in 2008. Duke's top returners will look to fill the void left by Bajoczky as the staff ace, while the Blue Devil bullpen remains intact except for Anderson. Freshman All-America closer **Michael Seander** returns for his sophomore season and could step into a starting role, while classmate **Michael Ness** should also be a source of quality innings. Junior **Andrew Wolcott**, who has topped 60 innings in each of his first two seasons, will also be counted on to shoulder a heavy workload as will sophomore **Will Currier**, who went 4-0 last season out of the bullpen.

Ron Causey and **Ryan Perry** are the lone seniors on the staff and should contribute largely in relief. Junior **Kyle Butler** will also likely see an increased role on the mound after posting a 2.92 ERA through nine appearances last season. Hassan and Gould will also toe the rubber when not playing in the outfield, while classmates **Jonathan Foreman** and **Christopher Manno** have the talent to emerge as top options out of the bullpen.

Also joining the squad is another talented recruiting class brought in by McNally and the Duke coaching staff. In addition to Lemmerman and Luciano, the newcomers include **Sam Allen**, **John Bunder**, **Ben Condon**, **Ryan Knott**, **Grant Monroe**, **Dennis O'Grady** and **Cameron Schulz**.

Bunder, Knott, Monroe and Lemmerman figure to contribute immediately, while Allen, O'Grady and Schulz could also earn some time on the mound and Condon and Luciano could see periodic action as well.

2007 Duke Baseball In Review



The Duke baseball team is coming off a tremendous 2007 campaign in which the Blue Devils put together the most wins, the highest batting average and the lowest team ERA in nearly a decade. Three Blue Devils were taken in the 2007 MLB Draft, including All-ACC selection Tony Bajoczyk.

The 2007 Duke baseball team finished the regular season at 29-25, marking the most wins for the program since 1998. Included in the near 30-win season were upsets over the No.1 and No. 2 ranked teams in the country as well as a shutout against Georgia Tech and series wins over ACC foes Maryland and Virginia Tech.

Led by the bats of senior **Jonathan Anderson**, juniors **Jimmy Gallagher** and **Brett Bartles** and sophomores **Nate Freiman** and **Matt Williams**, the Blue Devils batted over .300 for the first time in nearly a decade. Freiman, Gallagher, Anderson and Williams all batted over .300 with Freiman leading the way at .369, while Bartles tied Freiman for the team lead with seven home runs and 48 RBI. Both Bartles and Gallagher displayed enough talent to earn early draft selections and elected to forego their senior seasons in pursuit of a professional career in the major leagues. Two-way player **Alex Hassan** was also one of Duke's top producers, accounting for 73 runs on the season, while freshman classmate **Gabriel Saade** showed his offensive potential with five home runs, 11 stolen bases and a .456 slugging percentage. Junior **Jonathan Nicolla** settled in comfortably as the designated hitter and finished with a .321 batting average and 18 RBI, while freshman infielder **Ryan McCurdy** finished with 21 RBI and 24 runs before being sidelined with a shoulder injury.

Duke's pitching staff was equally as effective, as the Blue Devils turned in a combined ERA of 4.50, marking the lowest clip since 1996. All-ACC performer and Boston Red Sox draft selection **Tony Bajoczyk** was dominant all season, finishing at 9-3 with a 3.22 ERA, including a 6-3 record in conference play. Anderson also excelled on the mound, finishing with a career-best 2.91 ERA through 11 relief appearances and eight starts, while sophomore **Andrew Wolcott** contributed four victories and 62.0 innings through 17 appearances.

Duke's bullpen, anchored by Anderson and Freshman All-America closer **Michael Seander**, was one of the most reliable groups in recent history, as the Blue Devil relievers picked up 13 victories while turning in a combined 4.05 ERA. Seander quickly emerged as one of the top back-end relief specialists in the conference, racking up nine saves and a team-low 1.61 ERA over 28 appearances. Freshmen **Michael Ness**, **Will Currier** and **Jonathan Foreman** also solidified roles as Duke's top relievers, while sophomore **Kyle Butler** also provided a quality arm out of the bullpen.

The Blue Devils opened 2007 with a bang, rattling off a nine-game win streak that preceded a 15-1 start to the season. Included in the streak were a pair of three-game weekend sweeps over Mount St. Mary's and St. Bonaventure and another against Holy Cross to open the month of March.

Entering conference play, Duke dropped three games to Boston College, but rebounded to sweep Fairleigh Dickinson over a two-game spread by a combined score of 25-9, reaching double digits in each contest. Duke would go on to score 10 or more runs in 14 games, including all three bouts against St. Bonaventure.

In their second ACC series of the season, the Blue Devils fell just short of upsetting then-ranked No. 6 Clemson in the series opener before dropping a pair of hard-fought games to the Tigers on the road.

Duke would rebound over the second half of the season, however, beginning with a 3-0 shutout over Georgia Tech at Jack Coombs Field. The victory signaled the beginning of a breakout season for Bajoczyk,

who held the Yellow Jackets scoreless on five hits through seven innings of work. Entering the matchup with a 3-2 record, Bajoczyk would win six of his next seven decisions on the way to a 9-3 record on the season.

The momentum stayed in Bajoczyk's favor entering the next ACC series, as the senior right-hander, along with some help from freshman relief specialists Ness and Seander, powered the Blue Devils to an 8-5 win over the then-ranked No. 1 team in the nation, Florida State. A three-RBI afternoon by Hassan and a pair of triples from sparked the offensive fireworks, which continued through a 17-12 win at Davidson and a 13-9 victory at Virginia over the following weekend.

With a head of steam entering the annual rivalry matchup against North Carolina, Duke upset the No. 2-ranked Tar Heels 9-3 on another strong outing from Bajoczyk. Another offensive outburst, highlighted by three RBI from McCurdy and a pair of runs each from Williams and Anderson, allowed Bajoczyk to cruise through eight innings of work before turning the ball over to Seander in the ninth inning.

Duke would then take two of three from ACC foe Maryland following an 11-1 mid-series victory and a 4-2 win in the series finale. Bajoczyk tossed his first complete game of the season in Saturday's win, while Wolcott went six innings in the finale, allowing just two runs, before Seander took over with three hitless innings to close out the victory.

Duke followed with a 12-0 shutout over Campbell in which Gallagher went 5-for-6, while Frieman drove in four runs and Bartles and Hassan combined for five RBI. Anderson picked up the win with five scoreless innings, while Currier and seniors **Ron Causey** and **Ryan Perry** chipped in with a combined four scoreless innings in relief.

After dropping a road series at Wake Forest, the Blue Devils used a three-run ninth inning to overcome UNC Greensboro 5-4 and followed with a pair of conference wins over Virginia Tech. The three-game winning streak signaled the end of a tremendous run by the Blue Devils, which the team hopes to build off of in 2008.

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 106 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and 50 in men's (through fall 2007). In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.

The Wake Forest Demon Deacons captured the league's first baseball national title in 1954, the inaugural season of ACC baseball. The Miami Hurricanes, who joined the ACC for the 2004-05 campaign, has claimed four national hardball titles (1982, 1985, 1999, 2001) over the past 25 years.

Last season, the ACC produced another record season as it led all conferences and tied the league record for the second year in a row and third all-time with seven teams participating in the NCAA Tournament. Six of the seven teams (Clemson, Florida State, Miami, North Carolina, NC State and Virginia) returned to the national postseason event, while Wake Forest made an NCAA appearance for the first time since 2003. It marked the fifth time in ACC history that at least six teams received a bid into the national tournament. In addition, the ACC was one of two conferences to have a pair of teams garner a national seed as North Carolina earned the No. 3 overall seed and Florida State was No. 6. Over the last 11 years, the current 12 ACC schools have combined for 72 NCAA Tournament appearances, winning 61 percent of their games (236-152) and taking 17 trips to the College World Series.

The league also received unprecedented coverage in 2007, as a total of 53 ACC games were televised by various markets including all 13 contests in the ACC Baseball Tournament for the first time in league history. This year's coverage of the ACC Championship on a collection of six different television networks showcased the tournament being played in a round-robin format for the first time ever. North Carolina captured its first championship crown in 18 years and fifth overall, while Wake Forest became only the second No. 8 seeded team to advance to the title game, and individual session attendance was shattered three times.

After sending an ACC-record four teams to the College World Series in 2006, North Carolina returned to the CWS as the league's lone representative in 2007. The Tar Heels battled their way back to the CWS championship series for the second-straight year, a feat accomplished only twice in school history, but later succumbed to the defending national champion Oregon State Beavers. In the 61 years of the CWS, the battle between UNC and Oregon State marked only the second back-to-back national championship match-up in the event's history. UNC became the

fifth team to post consecutive runner-up finishes in the CWS and was one of three teams to have made a pair of appearances in the CWS finals since the NCAA went to its current championship format in 2003. The Tar Heels finished the 2007 season with an NCAA-best 57 victories and ranked second in the nation with a combined 111 wins from the past two years. (Rice led with 113.)

For the 16th straight season, the ACC posted a non-conference winning percentage over 60 percent, winning 73 percent of the games played against non-conference opponents in 2007. The ACC recorded 244 wins last season, pushing the conference's record to 3,913-1,560-20 (.714) in non-league play since 1990.

Last season marked just the second year of division play for the ACC, as Florida State won its first Atlantic title and North Carolina repeated as the Coastal winner. The 2007 championship, which was held at The Baseball Grounds of Jacksonville for third straight year, featured a new look as the tournament changed to a round-robin format. North Carolina captured its first championship crown in 18 years and fifth all-time after defeating Wake

Forest, only the second No. 8 seeded team to advance to the title game, by a score of 3-2. The individual session attendance mark for the ACC Baseball Championship in 2007 was broken three times and produced the third-best showing in its 34 year history as 59,325 fans attended the five-day affair.

One of the most profound seasons for ACC baseball came in 2006 when the league established several records. It marked the first year of divisional play for the conference, as Clemson claimed the Atlantic Division title while North

Carolina took home the Coastal Division crown. The league combined for a 255-86-1 record, setting an ACC mark for non-conference victories (255) in a single season. The previous record of 249 wins was set back in 2002. Not only did the ACC finish with the most wins (31) and the highest winning percentage (.674) among the 29 other conferences competing in the NCAA postseason in 2006, but the ACC also set a league record for the most teams (4) to make it to the CWS. With a 31-15 record, the ACC posted a winning percentage of .674, the third-best postseason showing in conference history. In addition, a new tournament attendance record was set at the 2006 ACC Championship as 73,251 fans attended the five-day event in Jacksonville.

The ACC has consistently infused Major League Baseball with talented players. The current 12 ACC schools have had 594 players selected in the MLB Draft since 1994, including 50 first-round picks. In 2007, the ACC set a new mark with 63 student-athletes selected in the Draft after sending a league-best 51 the previous year. The conference also had a trio of student-athletes chosen in the first round, extending the ACC's streak of at least one student-athlete selected in the first round to 16 consecutive years. Clemson led all schools for the second year in a row, as 11 Tigers were picked in the 2007 Draft. The ACC has produced four No. 1 overall picks in North Carolina's B.J. Surhoff in 1985, Florida State's Paul Wilson in 1994, Clemson's Kris Benson in 1996 and Miami's Pat Burrell in 1998.

Throughout the 119-year history of the Duke baseball program, the Blue Devils have seen more than 20 head coaches, three ACC Championships and over 1,700 victories. Duke has experienced its share of winning and losing seasons, but the one constant has been the academic performance of its student-athletes.

The Duke baseball team has long enjoyed a tradition of academic excellence. The Blue Devils lay claim to three Academic All-America selections and four Academic All-District honorees. Additionally, Duke has placed seven student-athletes on the All-ACC Academic Baseball team since the yearly award was instituted in 2006. Duke placed three student-athletes on the inaugural list and followed with four more in 2007, including repeat selection **Nate Freiman**.

Duke baseball has also made a strong showing year-in and year-out on the ACC's annual ACC Academic Honor Roll. Duke has placed 205 student-athletes on the annual list, including 17 four-time selections and 25 three-time honorees. The Duke baseball team has played a significant role in helping Duke University place the most student-athletes on the ACC Academic Honor Roll for 19 consecutive years.

The program's strong academic tradition has strengthened during the tenure of third-year head coach **Sean McNally**, who was an Academic All-America and a four-time ACC Academic Honor Roll selection during his playing career at Duke from 1991-94. McNally has ensured that the tradition of academic excellence remains at the forefront of the baseball program and seeks out potential recruits who fill the mold of the Duke student-athlete.

Three members of McNally's first recruiting class were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll as freshmen, while **Gabriel Saade** also earned a spot on the All-ACC Academic squad after his first year as a Blue Devil.

Four former Duke standouts, including **Brett Bartles**, **Larry Broadway**, **Ryan Jackson** and **Tony Runion**, who elected to forego their senior seasons after being drafted as juniors, have also returned under McNally's watch to complete their degree requirements.





Duke Baseball I And The ACC Academic Honor Roll

Each season, the Atlantic Coast Conference recognizes its student-athletes who successfully balance the rigors of playing Division I athletics with performance in the classroom. Student-athletes who meet the criteria are listed in the ACC's annual Academic Honor Roll, which is released at the beginning of each academic year.

To be eligible for the ACC Academic Honor Roll, the student-athlete must have maintained at least a 3.0 grade point average during the previous academic year in addition to participating in a varsity level sport. In the most recent 2006-07 Academic Honor Roll, Duke led all ACC schools after placing 394 student-athletes on the prestigious list. Last year's list marked the 19th straight year in which Duke placed the most student-athletes on the ACC Academic Honor Roll.

Ten of Duke's selections were members of the baseball team, three of which were freshmen and five of which have picked up multiple honors in their career.



The Blue Devils have not only stepped up on the diamond in recent years, but in the community as well. Over the past two seasons, the Duke baseball team has made a collective effort to become an active force in the community, volunteering time at local schools and non-profit service initiatives.

"Our players have embraced the concept of service and participation in the Durham community as fundamental to being a part of our baseball program," head coach Sean McNally said. "I am very proud of their efforts and know that they understand their impact in the community as role models to people of all ages. Andrew Wolcott has provided great leadership in this area as demonstrated by our participation in a wide range of projects last fall. We look forward to continuing our efforts in the Durham community in the years to come."

Junior pitcher Andrew Wolcott has served as the team's community service liaison for the past two seasons and is in charge of organizing various projects throughout the academic year. This year alone, the Blue Devils have taken part in six different endeavors, including a Habitat for Humanity building project, Durham's "Make A Difference Day" and cooking and serving breakfast at the Urban Ministries of Durham. The team is also heavily involved in the university's Verizon Read with the Blue Devils program, which is a school-wide initiative that allows Duke's student-athletes to visit local elementary and middle schools to read to students.

"Community service is something that is greatly emphasized within our program and is very important to our guys," Wolcott said. "It is not always easy to find time to volunteer, but our team has taken a great initiative and has made a positive impact within the Durham community this year."

Several of the Blue Devils also volunteer as tutors at George Watts Montessori Elementary School, taking time to read with to the children and help with classwork. To interact with the students outside of the classroom, the team also put together a day-long baseball clinic at the school where they taught over 250 first through fifth grade students the game of baseball as part of their physical education class.

Duke Baseball History

Duke capped its 118th season of baseball in 2007 and took a significant step toward returning the program to its glory days of the 1990's. The 2007 Blue Devils flirted with 30 wins for the first time since 1998, finishing the season with a 29-25 overall record. Led by second-year head coach Sean McNally, the team batted over .300 for the first time in nearly a decade and upset the top-two teams in the nation in No. 1 Florida State and No. 2 North Carolina. Three more Blue Devils added their names to the long list of Duke's major league draft choices, as senior Tony Bajoczky and juniors Brett Bartles and Jimmy Gallagher moved on to the professional ranks.

Bajoczky, Bartles and Gallagher became the 40th, 41st and 42nd Blue Devils to be drafted and Duke's sixth class of three or more draftees. Gallagher, taken in the seventh round by the Chicago White Sox with the 239th overall pick, became the highest-drafted Duke outfielder in school history. Bartles followed with a 30th round selection by the Cincinnati Reds, while Bajoczky fell off the board in the 34th round to the Boston Red Sox. After solid debuts in various rookie leagues, the trio is well on the way to joining the list of 38 Duke baseball players who made it to the majors, including current big leaguers Chris Capuano and Scott Schoeneweis.

Duke baseball has churned out some of the ACC's most talented players on a yearly basis. In Duke's 57 years in the ACC, 57 Blue Devils have garnered All-ACC honors, including 21 repeat selections and seven three-time honorees. Bajoczky was Duke's most recent selection, collecting second team recognition as a senior. The list of former Blue Devils also includes a number of All-America selections and the 1994 National Player of the Year, Ryan Jackson. Current sophomore Michael Seander became Duke's most recent All-American after collecting three different Freshman All-America citations in 2007.

The Duke Baseball Story

One of the longest-standing baseball programs in the nation, the story of Duke baseball begins in 1889 when a handful of Blue Devils, then attending the institution under the name of Trinity

College, first fielded a team. During the program's first decade, Duke squared off against a number of amateur teams, including the Augusta YMCA, Franklin, Mebane and the Winston YMCA. The Blue Devils even managed to play a pair of scrimmages, though both losses, against the major league affiliate Brooklyn Superbas in 1897.

During the early 1900's, the Blue Devils went 141-66 under the guidance of four different head coaches, including M.T. Adkins. Adkins coached the team from 1908 through 1914 and was the first Blue Devil head coach to top 100 wins, finishing his career with a 104-67-4 ledger. Adkins guided the Blue Devils to double-digit wins during every seasons, including four straight seasons of 16 or more victories during each of his first four years at the helm.


After Adkins' departure in 1914, nine different coaches spent at least one season calling the shots until the namesake of the Blue Devils' home field, Jack "Mr. Baseball" Coombs took the reigns of the program in 1929. Coombs would spend the next 24 seasons as Duke's head coach, compiling a career 381-171-3 record for the most wins in school history. During Coombs' tenure, Duke had only one losing season – an 11-18-1 mark in 1950 – and claimed five Southern Conference titles, three NCAA District titles and seven North Carolina Championships. Coombs also led the Blue Devils to their first College World Series berth after putting together a remarkable 31-7 record in 1952 in his final season. One of the first college baseball players to move on to the professional ranks, Coombs capped his nearly half-a-century long baseball career at the age of 70 when he retired as the longest-tenured and winningest coach in Duke baseball history.

During Coombs' final two seasons, Duke's roster was host to some of the most decorated players in program history. A pair of two-time All-Americans and two-time All-SoCon selections – Dick Groat and Bill Werber – etched their names in the record books in the early 1950's to set the tone for Duke's entrance into the Atlantic Coast Conference. Groat went on to play 16 seasons in the major leagues, collecting MVP honors with the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1960, five National League


All-Star selections and a pair of World Series rings. Werber stayed on the Blue Devil squad for three seasons and in 1953, teamed up with All-American outfielder Al Spangler to lead Duke to its second College World Series appearance.

In 1954, Duke joined the ACC and spared no time in racking up its first two conference championships, claiming back-to-back league titles in 1956 and 1957. Duke placed a school-record six Blue Devils on the All-ACC team in 1957, including undoubtedly the fastest baseball player in school history, a Paterson, N.J., native by the name of Dave Sime. Sime came to Duke on a baseball scholarship, but his speed on the base paths caught the eye of Duke's track and field coach. Sime joined the track squad in his own words, "for kicks," and went on to set three world records, including the 100 meter, the 200 meter and the 200 meter hurdles. Duke's stolen base leader in 1957, Sime batted .376 with a team-leading four home runs in the same season to lead the Blue Devils to their second consecutive ACC Championship. As a freshman, he was clocked running from home plate to first base at 3.5 seconds from the right-handed batter's box, just three-tenths of a second shy of the left-handed Mickey Mantle's heralded mark of 3.2 seconds.


Duke continued to churn out quality student-athletes through the late 1950's and 1960's under the guidance of head coach Ace Parker. Parker spent 14 seasons as a Blue Devil from 1953 through 1966 and compiled 166 victories and an overall ACC slate of 84-79-2, including three conference championships. In addition to guiding Duke to its third College World Series appearance in 1961, Parker coached three of Duke's seven three-time All-ACC selections while bringing in 35





All-ACC awards during his tenure. Biff Bracy, Lynn Fader and Pete Maynard were Parker's three-time all-conference selections, with Bracy becoming the second of just three Blue Devils in school history to collect three first-team honors.

Parker stepped down following the 1966 season to make way for the team's next five head coaches, who each spent multiple seasons in the Blue Devil dugout. Both Enos Slaughter and Tom D'Armi were the longest-tenured of the group, as each coached seven seasons, with D'Armi taking the reigns to open the 1970's. D'Armi became Duke's next 100-game winner

Scott Schoeneweis (1993-1996)

after putting together a 125-98-2 record during his term while also becoming Duke's first-ever ACC Coach Of The Year in 1981. Of D'Armi's seven seasons, Duke posted winning records in five, including a pair of 20-win campaigns in 1981 (29-10) and 1984 (25-13).

Following D'Armi's departure, head coach Steve Traylor took over in 1988 and ushered in a

new era for Duke baseball, rebuilding the program into a perennial national powerhouse. Traylor remains the only Duke head coach to come close to touching Coombs' 381 career victories, finishing his 12-year career with a 356-286-1

record built by seven straight seasons with 30 or more wins and 11 consecutive with 20 or more victories. Under Traylor's direction, Duke batted .290 or better eight times, including a .323 clip in 1994, and sent 24 players to the professional ranks via the MLB Draft. Traylor was named ACC Coach of the Year in 1992 after guiding the Blue Devils to a 38-16 record, which at the time set a record for the most wins in school history.

During Traylor's tenure, Duke churned out some of the most decorated players in school history, including 13 All-ACC selections, five All-Region honorees and numerous school record holders. Included in that list are Duke's all-time sto-

len base and triples leader Quinton McCracken, all-time wins leader Scott Schoeneweis, the 1994 All-Region trio of Ryan Jackson, Sean McNally and Scott Pinoni and all-time batting average leader Vaughn Schill. Six Blue Devils earned multiple all-conference honors under Traylor, including McCracken, Jackson, Becker, Pinoni, Schill and pitcher Stephen Cowie.

While Traylor's teams had some of the best offensive output in program history, Duke's 1994 squad was statistically the most potent collection of offensive talent in Duke baseball history. Led by the All-ACC and All-Region trio of Ryan Jackson, Sean McNally and Scott Pinoni, Duke set school records for home runs, RBI, hits, doubles and runs scored. All three batted over .370 and combined for 56 home runs, 199 RBI and 192 runs scored. Jackson launched a school-record 22 homers, while

McNally set four single season records of his own with a .408 batting average, 89 hits, a .775 slugging percentage and a .468 on base percentage. All three were taken in the 1994 draft and still own Duke's top-three single season total base and slugging percentage records. Jackson became Duke's first National Player of the Year and ACC Player of the Year and a first team All-America selection in the same season, while McNally earned Academic All-America honors and Pinoni collected his second straight first team All-ACC honor.

Ryan Jackson (1991-1994)

The 1994 Duke roster boasted eight future draft selections, including current major league relief pitcher and Duke's all-time wins leader Scott Schoeneweis. The second-highest drafted pitcher in Duke history, Schoeneweis left Duke with a school-record 30 career victories and 315 career strikeouts for the second-highest total on Duke's career list.

The mid-1990's saw the Blue Devils continue a run of seven straight 30-win seasons, including a school-record 39 victories in 1996. Led by ACC Freshman of the Year Jeff Becker, it took Duke just 37 games to reach 30 victories before finishing the season with a 39-18 overall record. After turning in a

team-high .364 batting average in his first season, Becker would go on to set Duke's all-time hits, doubles, RBI, runs scored games played and games started records.

Duke's success continued through the 1997-99 seasons when the program's only

three-time All-America choice, shortstop Vaughn Schill, led the Blue Devils to a combined 95-76 record during his three-year tenure, including a 38-win campaign in 1998. Schill batted no less than .367 each season and left his mark on the program by setting Duke's all-time batting average record. A career .380 hitter, Schill was selected in the fourth round of the 1999 MLB draft by the Seattle Mariners.

Vaughn Schill (1997-1999)

Bill Hillier took over coaching duties in 2000 and led the Blue Devils to three 20-win seasons during his years in the Duke dugout. During his six-year

tenure, Hillier coached a pair of All-ACC selections and sent six Blue Devils to the professional ranks via the MLB Draft, including 2002 third-round selection Larry Broadway.

During his three-year career at Duke, Broadway compiled a .324 batting average, 44 doubles and 17 home runs before being drafted as a junior by the Montreal Expos. Broadway has since returned to Duke to finish his degree and is currently on the verge of breaking into the big leagues after spending the 2006 and 2007 seasons with the Washington Nationals' Triple-A affiliate.

Now in its second century of competition, the Blue Devils will play their 119th season under the guidance of head coach and Duke alumnus Sean McNally. The 22nd head coach in the history of Duke baseball, McNally now enters his third season at the helm

after a four-year playing career as a Blue Devil from 1991-94. Mc-





Duke History: Jack Coombs

Nicknamed "Mr. College Baseball," Jack Coombs built a reputation as one of the most outstanding college baseball coaches in the country. In 24 years as head baseball coach at Duke, Coombs led the school to three NCAA District titles, five Southern Conference crowns and seven North Carolina championships. He retired from coaching at the age of 70 after compiling a 381-171-3 record at Duke from 1929-52. In 1951, he coached Duke to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb., where the Blue Devils lost in the third round. Coombs, who called himself "The Old Man," sent 47 players to the Major Leagues including Dick Groat, Bill Werber, Chubby Dean, Harold Wagner, George Barley, Larry "Crash" Davis, Eric Tipton, Russ Bergman and Eddie Shokes.

Born in LeGrande, Iowa, Coombs learned to play baseball on the rocky fields of Maine before attending Colby College. He became one of the first college players to ever play in the Major Leagues.

Upon entering the big leagues with the Philadelphia Athletics in 1906, he soon acquired the nickname "Colby Jack" because of his association with Colby College. In his first year in the Major Leagues with the Athletics, he pitched and won the longest game on record in the American League — 24 innings, Philadelphia Athletics vs. Boston Red Sox, Sept. 1, 1906. Under the guidance of Coach Connie Mack, Coombs won fame as a member of the team's great pitching threesome — Coombs, Bender and Plank.




He helped Philadelphia win three world championships. He is one of the few pitchers to win three games in a single World Series and one of the only pitchers to win five World Series games, concluding his career with a 5-1 World Series record.

After starring for the Athletics for eight seasons (1906-14), he signed a contract with the Brooklyn Dodgers. He played for Brooklyn for four years (1915-18) where he pitched under manager Wilbert Robinson.

In 1919, Coombs withdrew his name from the active player list and immediately got into coaching. He managed the Philadelphia Phillies and was a coach with the Detroit Tigers before accepting a position as head baseball coach at Williams College in Williamstown, Mass. He was the head coach at Williams for three years, then moved to Princeton University, where he remained until he took the Duke post in 1929.

Duke Baseball Facilities



The home of Duke baseball is picturesque Jack Coombs Field. Named after Duke's most illustrious baseball coach who compiled a record of 382-171 at Duke from 1929-1951, Jack Coombs Field is located in the heart of Duke's athletic complex, affording easy access to baseball fans on campus and in Durham.

Dimensions of the spacious park are 330-feet down each foul line, 365 in the power alleys and 405-feet to dead centerfield. Surrounded, sheltered and enclosed by trees and hills, the stadium features a natural grass surface and a tree-lined scenic view beyond the outfield fence. Seating capacity is 2,000 fans.

Under the direction of Director of Athletics Joe Alleva and head coach Sean McNally, Jack Coombs Field has recently undergone numerous upgrades both to the stadium and to the playing field.

The newest addition to the complex is a completely overhauled locker room that includes new lockers, a mural that features former Duke baseball greats and a player lounge complete with a big screen TV and three leather couches where players and coaches can relax and review video. The Blue Devils also showcase their rich baseball history with an Alumni Hall of Honor in the Team Room area and the Coaches Choice Lounge.



Duke baseball lays claim to an upgraded locker room that was remodeled prior to the start of the 2007 season. In addition to new lockers, banners and a Duke baseball mural featuring former Duke greats also hang in the players' facility.

A 120-feet-by 50-feet enclosed, all-weather hitting and pitching facility was added along the third base line in 2001. The facility features six batting cages, astroturf and a stereo sound system. A pitching machine with a self-feeder, training equipment such as a Medicine Ball Tree and agility ladders are also included in the indoor facility.

Additionally, the field itself has benefited from recent upgrades. A sprinkler system with infield dirt sprinkler heads has been installed to keep the field in excellent condition. Lights were installed prior to the 2001 season to allow for night games while the Blue Devils have also added a centerfield hitter's screen, screens for batting practice

and an infield grass net. Most recently, the first and third base paths were cut out and lined with clay prior to the 2007 season. Heaters have also been installed in the home dugouts.

A flag pole display at the entrance to the stadium greets spectators as they approach the field, and black wrought iron fencing has been added to enclose the stadium. There have also been numerous changes inside the confines of Jack Coombs Field. An outfield wall has been built and flag poles have been added in the outfield to dress up the stadium. Fans can also enjoy Blue Devil baseball in increased comfort, as chair-back seats have been added to the bleachers under the grandstand. Duke baseball fans will also enjoy an improved public address system featuring Bose speakers.

Also planned for the near future are several aesthetic additions to the facilities, team locker room and coaches' offices. Mesh banners featuring former Blue Devil greats will outline the outfield fences and outer walls of the indoor batting cages, while numerous plaques honoring Duke's All-ACC and All-America selections will be mounted to the locker room walls. The coaches' offices will receive murals of their own featuring past coaches and players who helped in creating the Duke baseball tradition.

Duke's coaches, who have worked diligently to make these improvements possible, also reap some of the benefits. Head coach Sean McNally's office at Coombs Field has been remodeled and expanded to include a lounge room and meeting room for recruits and players. Pitching coach Sean Snedeker's office is also housed in the complex.



Duke University

Duke University was created in 1924 by James Buchanan Duke as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. The Dukes, a Durham family who built a worldwide financial empire in the manufacture of tobacco and developed the production of electricity in the two Carolinas, had long been interested in Trinity College. Trinity traced its roots to 1838 in nearby Randolph County when local Methodist and Quaker communities joined forces to support a permanent school, which they named Union Institute. After a brief period as Normal College (1851-59), the school changed its name to Trinity College in 1859 and affiliated with the Methodist Church.

The college moved to Durham in 1892 with financial assistance from Washington Duke and the donation of land by Julian S. Carr. In December 1924, the school's trustees gratefully accepted the provisions of James B. Duke's indenture creating the family philanthropic foundation, The Duke Endowment, which provided, in part, for the expansion of Trinity College into Duke University.

As a result of the Duke gift, Trinity underwent both physical and academic expansion. The original Durham Campus became known as East Campus when it was rebuilt in stately Georgian architecture. West Campus, Gothic in style and dominated by the soaring 210-foot tower of Duke Chapel, opened in 1930. Academic expansion of the university included the establishment of new graduate and professional schools.

Modern times have seen Duke realize its founder's aspirations to become a major center of learning. The Duke University Medical Center has achieved international prominence, and many Duke schools and departments are consistently ranked among the nation's best.



DURHAM, NORTH CAROLINA


Located in the heart of North Carolina's rolling Piedmont region, Durham stands out as a gem among southern cities. Through the years, the city has evolved from a tobacco and textile town into an international center for medicine, scholarship, biotechnology and electronics.

Founded in 1853, Durham is widely recognized for its diversity. Originally a manufacturing center, the city now is known for excellence in medicine, education, research and industry. The wide range of activities available in the area lends the city a multifaceted appeal that strikes even first-time visitors.

Durham has a natural appeal as well, characterized by 98,000 acres of hardwood and evergreen forests including the only remaining old growth Piedmont bottomland forests and 7,800 acres of cropland. Hills and dales, meandering rivers and streams, several lakes, 26 rare plant species and several rare species of birds and animals can also be found here.

With 227,000 residents in the one-city county, Durham is the fourth-largest city in North Carolina. It is ideally located on the large and small scale. Within the immediate area it stands as the pinnacle of the "Triangle" region of North Carolina, a metropolitan population of 1,000,000 people that includes Chapel Hill to the south and west and Raleigh, the state capital, to the south and east. On a regional level, this area is the primary center of culture, sports, education and government between Washington, D.C., and Atlanta.

With excellent sports and cultural activities in the area, Durham is a fun place to be. People from all walks of life — academic, industrial, professional, agricultural — blend to provide a warm, rich sense of hospitality and diversity.
